

varies from ten per cent, a week to ten p cent a month, never less than the latter figur The law, which fixes the interest rate at 8; cent, in most Southern states, is evaded 1 making the note call for a sum much larg than is actually borrowed. The rate of inteest expressed therein is in keeping with the statute, but if the borrower seeks a renewal, I must pay according to the understanding reached when the loan was made, without reference to the legal rate of interest. I the event that the matter is brought to the attention of the authorities, which has beedone in a few instances, it becomes merely matter of veracity between the monlender and the customer, as the note bear no evidence of evasion or transgression ( the law. Thus the "loan sharks," as thi class are known, prosper and grow fat with practically no interference on the part of the officers of the law.
